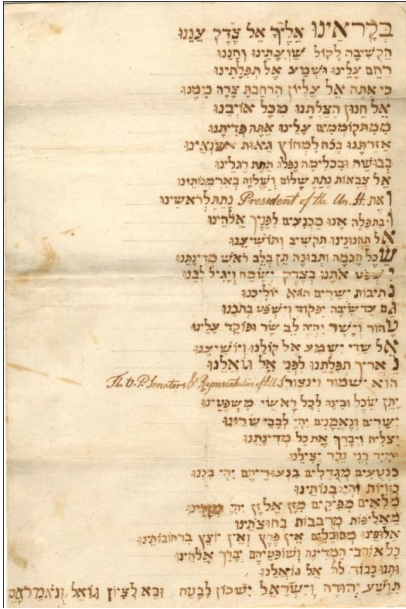


# FOURTH FLOOR: REVOLUTIONARY WAR GALLERY ACTIVITY

Can you find this artifact?

This is in the style of an acrostic. This means each line begins with a certain letter, so that all these first letters down one side of the page spells out something important, like a name. Because this is Hebrew, the first letters are along the right side of the page.

This acrostic spells out a name beginning on the 10<sup>th</sup> line and going through the 19<sup>th</sup>. Can you figure out whose name it is?

[Hint: The Hebrew letter is a vav. In English it would be a W.]
