
WINTER 2017-2018 PROGRAMS AT THE
NATIONAL MUSEUM OF AMERICAN JEWISH HISTORY

PHILADELPHIA—The **National Museum of American Jewish History** (NMAJH) announces a variety of programs for all ages this winter. Just in time for the 30th anniversary of “Freedom Sunday”—the historic Washington, D.C. rally demanding rights for Soviet Jews—visitors can explore the panel exhibition ***Power of Protest: The Movement to Free Soviet Jews*** and attend a related program. Museumgoers can get in the holiday spirit at the Young Friends of NMAJH’s ***Cocktails and Candle Lighting*** Hanukkah celebration and annual ***Being ___ at Christmas*** extravaganza. In the new year, the Museum will offer free admission and fun activities on **Martin Luther King, Jr. Day** and **Presidents Day**. The full list of programs follows:

Power of Protest: The Movement to Free Soviet Jews

Wednesday, December 6, 2017 – Monday, January 15, 2018

The personal stories of American Jewish activists and Soviet Jews will be explored in ***Power of Protest: The Movement to Free Soviet Jews***, a panel exhibition created by NMAJH. The exhibition will focus on Americans’ efforts in the late 1960s through 1990 to free *refuseniks*—Jews who lived in the Soviet Union and were denied the rights to live freely, practice Judaism, or leave the country due to their religion—through what *The Atlantic*’s Jeffrey Goldberg has called “the most successful human rights campaign of our time.” The exhibition will travel to venues nationwide.
